SPOTLIGHT ON STEAM: A LEARNER'S EDGE

A webinar titled Spotlight on STEAM: A Learner's Edge was organised by Department of Physics, M.C. Kejriwal Vidyapeeth on 2nd October, 2020. The webinar was designed to provide an insight and understanding regarding the key concepts of 'STEAM Education' with reference to NEP 2020. The importance of inter-disciplinary approach towards the teaching-learning process and the practical



steps involved in planning and conducting a STEAM Classroom were also discussed. The webinar was attended by the students, parents and teachers of M.C. Kejriwal Vidyapeeth and also by several students of other reputed schools. The event started with words of encouragement from our revered Chairman, Mr.Kishan Kumar Kejriwal followed by an international panel of four eminent speakers hailing from diverse background enumerating on various facets of STEAM education. Ritu Sehji, Head of Food Technology at West Lake Boys High School, New Zealand, spoke about the meaning and benefits of STEAM learning and suggested formats for organising a STEAM classroom. The second speaker Rina Mitra, Head of Centre for Creative and Performing Arts, NSHM Kolkata Campus, explained the inseparable bond between the left and the right brain; 'the Arts and the Science' thus focussing on integrated learning. Dr. Shreyosi Mukherjee, content QA editor at Hennessey Digital, Singapore, illustrated that narrow boundaries of the specific subjects must be shattered to get an edge in today's interdisciplinary world. Dr. Soma Chakraborty, an eminent Data Scientist and also KTP Associate, Dept. Of Biomedical Engineering, University of Reading, UK, shed light on the need and importance of

interdisciplinary outlook towards a problem by giving various examples of scientific breakthroughs that were achieved by the means of collaboration between several scientists from diverse backgrounds. On the whole, it was an enriching webinar that gave us a new perspective of the modern education system.
























My Lost Diary
